FRIDAY, OCTOBER 9, 2009—WSU MAIN CAMPUS

NEW Ethical and Legal Issues in Social Work and Social Work Supervision – 9:00 a.m. – 3:00 p.m. (5.0 CE Hours)

This workshop provides participants with a broad overview of legal and ethical issues important to social work practice and the provision of social work supervision. The potential risks and liabilities inherent in practice, both ethical and legal, will be addressed along with recommendations to minimize risks. Ethical and legal issues related to professional boundaries, confidentiality and competence will be covered. Participants will become acquainted with the sections of the NASW Code of Ethics and the Social Work Licensure Law (P.A. 61 of 2004) that affect social work supervision. This workshop is appropriate for all levels of social work practice.

Instructor: Addie Williams, MSW, JD is the CEO of Spaulding for Children. She has substantial experience in social work administration and expertise in the area of child welfare. She also maintains a law practice and serves as a consultant attorney to area agencies regarding foster care and adoption issues. She teaches a course on social work and the law at the WSU School of Social Work and conducts workshops on social work ethics and the law.

Contemporary Trends in Clinical Supervision – 9:00 a.m. – 4:30 p.m. (6.0 CE Hours)

This workshop will provide a comprehensive model for social work supervision, with an integration of the systems-interactional-developmental-relational components. The application of attachment theory and the impact of transference-countertransference on the supervisory relationship will be included. Supervision as a triadic system (client-supervisee-supervisor), relational and intersubjective contributions to supervision and the unique aspects of supervising professionals new to the field will be included. Clinical examples and opportunities for application to supervisory experience will be included throughout the day. This workshop is appropriate for intermediate and advanced levels of practice.

Instructor: Anne Brantley Segall, LMSW has extensive experience as a social work practitioner in health and mental health settings. She has provided consultation on clinical practice to a number of social work agencies in the metropolitan area. She is currently the curricula consultant to the Virtual Center for Excellence at The Guidance Center. She sits on the boards of state and national social work associations and is involved in developing recommendations for social work supervision for the Association of Social Work Boards.

Integrative Couple Therapy – 9:00 a.m. – 4:30 p.m. (6.0 CE Hours)

This workshop will provide an integrative approach for assessment and treatment of relational problems frequently presented by couples in therapy. Attendees will be introduced to a systematic method for evaluating the type of intervention that may be the most useful at various stages of couple therapy and interventions aimed at differing levels of conflict and dysfunction. The workshop will expose attendees to techniques aimed at altering behavioral, affective and unconscious/intrapsychic dynamics that contribute to problematic couple relationships. This workshop is appropriate for intermediate and advanced level practitioners.

Instructor: David Castine, LMSW, LMFT has taught marital therapy and family therapy at the WSU School of Social Work. He has extensive experience in clinical social work practice in inpatient and outpatient mental health settings. He has worked with children, adults, families and couples. David is an approved AAMFT supervisor.

CONTINUING EDUCATION CERTIFICATE IN CLINICAL SUPERVISION

The WSU School of Social Work offers a Continuing Education Certificate in Clinical Supervision for social workers who wish to develop their knowledge and skill as providers of clinical supervision. Three continuing education courses comprise the certificate: **Ethical and Legal Issues in Social Work and Social Work Supervision** (October 9), **Clinical Supervision in Social Work** (Spring 2010) and **Contemporary Trends in Clinical Supervision** (October 9). *Please Note: Only one of the three courses can be taken now, but all three courses will be offered again in Spring 2010. FRIDAY, OCTOBER 23, 2009—WSU OAKLAND CENTER

Integrating New Approaches to Substance Abuse Treatment – 9:00 a.m. – 4:30 p.m. (6.0 CE Hours*) *One hour of this workshop also meets the requirement for Pain Management continuing education.

Co-occurring disorders, motivational enhancement, pain management and recovery management are four developments in substance abuse treatment which significantly alter the recommended approach. Many people have attended workshops on these concepts; however, program structure, mandated clientele and practitioner comfort level make their implementation inconsistent, at best. One purpose of this workshop is to look at ways to integrate these concepts into everyday practice. Whether these trends can be integrated into a comprehensive model will be discussed. It will also be considered whether a new paradigm for substance abuse treatment is emerging. This will require an understanding of harm reduction, an approach highly discouraged in this country. The presenters will look at ways in which a modified version of harm reduction is present in some of these approaches. The best use of the workshop is for people with some understanding of these concepts.

Instructors: Dennis Muzzi, LMSW and Tammy Domroese, PsyD have worked in behavioral health for many years, including practice with impaired health professionals. They provide services to health professionals with addiction challenges for two to five years. This long-term perspective has provided the presenters with a unique view of recovery over time. The population served also includes a large number of health professionals who struggle with chronic pain, some as a result of their work. The presenters have used this to begin a chronic pain support and therapy group; the results of which they will share at this workshop.

Effective Strategies to Address Organizational Challenges – 9:00 a.m. – 4:30 p.m. (6.0 CE Hours)

Social work administration requires specialized knowledge and skill. The purpose of this workshop is to examine commonly occurring administrative/management/supervisory challenges and provide participants with the opportunity to address these. Team building, persuasiveness, “picking battles,” use of consultation, and recruiting and retaining qualified staff are topics which will be covered. This workshop is appropriate for all levels of social work practice.

Instructor: Angela Kennedy, LMSW is an experienced social work administrator, having run a number of large social welfare agencies in the metropolitan area. She is a part-time faculty member at the WSU School of Social Work, teaching courses on macro practice. She has received numerous awards and commendations for her professional activities at the local, regional and state levels.

A Cognitive-Behavioral Approach to Pain Management – 9:00 a.m. – 12:15 p.m. (3.0 CE Hours)

This workshop will address methods to treat clients who present with pain management concerns. Compensatory strategies including distraction or other focus, imagery, relaxation, breathing, cognitive restructuring, problem solving, stop thought and replacement, down arrow to core beliefs, competence and pleasure procedures, resiliency reinforcement and exercise will be presented. Professional collaboration issues and relapse prevention will be covered.

Instructor: Kathleen Ransome, LMSW, ACSW, LMFT, ACT is a skilled clinician with an extensive background in providing individual and group psychotherapy. She has a special interest in the treatment of women, mood disorders, co-existing medical conditions, and grief and loss issues. She has presented at conferences on the cognitive behavioral group treatment of depression. Currently, she serves as program coordinator for Behavioral Health at Henry Ford Health System.

Conflict Resolution Strategies for Social Work Practice – 9:00 a.m. – 4:30 p.m. (6.0 CE Hours)

This workshop will explore a number of conflict resolution concepts, strategies, theories and processes. Social psychology, communication and social work literature will be presented and used as a framework to analyze conflicts and initiate appropriate interventions to a conflictual situation in a range of social work practice settings. This workshop is appropriate for all levels of social work practice.

Instructor: Pauline Everette, MSW, PhD is a part-time faculty member at the WSU School of Social Work with specialized training in mediation and dispute resolution. She has a private psychotherapy practice and consults with numerous community organizations on a range of mental health issues.

Fund Development and Grant Writing Strategies – 9:00 a.m. – 4:30 p.m. (6.0 CE Hours)

This workshop will be of interest to social work practitioners in micro, mezzo or macro practice. Attendees will develop knowledge and skill in fund development, program development and grant writing. Development strategies, methodologies for generating income and giving trends will be addressed. The components of grant writing and methods to identify potential funders will be highlighted. Attendees will further their understanding of nonprofit operations and gain new information that can further their career options. This workshop is appropriate for all levels of social work practice.

Instructor: Deanna McGraw, MSW, LMSW, ACSW served as president of Detroit Executive Corps. She has 25 years of experience in program development, fund development, grant writing and agency operations. She is Board Chair of the Executive Service Corps Affiliate Network and has taught at Lawrence Technological University.

FRIDAY, OCTOBER 30, 2009—WSU MACOMB CENTER

Psychotherapy with Older Adults – 9:00 a.m. – 4:30 p.m. (6.0 CE Hours)

Social work practice with older adults requires a sound understanding of the developmental trajectory of individuals in this life stage and familiarity and skill with the most effective treatment approaches. This workshop will provide an overview of this last stage of development (highlighting the writings of Erickson) and review the CBT, Psychodynamic and IPT models of treatment and treatment in home, office or community living settings. This workshop is appropriate for all levels of social work practice.

Instructor: Suzanne Rodgers, LMSW has substantial experience in work with older adults, along with 20 years of experience providing social work services to children, adults and families. She has completed both the child and adult psychoanalytic psychotherapy educational programs at the Michigan Psychoanalytic Institute where she co-leads a seminar on psychotherapy with older adults.

Using the DSM-IV-TR in Clinical Practice – 9:00 a.m. – 4:30 p.m. (6.0 CE Hours)

This workshop, designed for practitioners with limited knowledge of the DSM, will provide participants the needed knowledge and skills to use the DSM in an effective and ethical manner. The five Axes will be reviewed and the differences between Axis I and II will be examined. Case material will be presented and participants will have the opportunity to use the DSM with case material to develop diagnoses on a range of mental health conditions.

Instructor: Peggy O’Kane Brunhofer, PhD, LMSW has extensive experience as a social work practitioner in health and mental health settings and as a social work educator. She currently functions as the Director of Continuing Education at the WSU School of Social Work.
