Examining the iatrogenic effect of law enforcement disruptions to the illicit drug market on overdose in the surrounding community.

This central objective of this project is *to identify whether the seizure of illicit substances from specific communities has an iatrogenic effect of increasing fatal or non-fatal overdose events.* We outline a multi-level research approach to examine this question through integration of national data sources as well as collection of local data in three U.S. cities – Detroit, Indianapolis, and Nashville – to obtain geospatial and temporal measures that allow us to assess direct impact on fatal and non-fatal overdose events. Moreover, within each of these cities, we will develop procedures to conduct mass-spectrometry testing to compare illicit drugs involved in fatal overdose events or law enforcement seizures. Finally, we will shape prospective data collection on drug seizures and overdose through collaborations with Overdose Fatality Review Teams (OFRTs), which bring law enforcement together with public health, public safety, treatment, and death investigators, **Centers for Disease Control and Prevention: \$1,087,498.00.**

Harm Reduction Service Outreach Program

Since the 1950s street outreach programs have addressed issues such as homelessness, violence, and disease prevention.¹ Outreach teams informed by the philosophy and practice of harm reduction have demonstrated ability to connect vulnerable persons who use drugs to health care services.² Through the Division of Mental

Health and Addiction (DMHA), the state of Indiana is implementing ten (10) harm reduction street outreach (HRSO) teams for two-years. The HRSOs are intended to consist of two outreach workers per team who will engage with persons who use drugs in the community to provide information on and referrals to treatment services and distribute harm reduction kits. To understand the implementation processes and effectiveness of these teams, this evaluation is guided by the Exploration, Preparation, Implementation, and Sustainability framework, which seeks involvement from stakeholders who understand the external and internal context towards this innovative programming, **FSSA: \$75,000.**

Regional Judicial Opioid Initiative Comprehensive Opioid Abuse Site-Based Grant 2017 – 2021

Using crowdsourcing to understand how individuals in the U.S. would spend \$100 billion to solve the overdose crisis.

Despite the critical need to ascertain lawmakers' attitudes and opinions on how to best fund, and by extension address the overdose crisis, there remains a lack of knowledge about community-members' opinions on how to best appropriate federal funding as it related to the overdose crisis. The need to increase knowledge in this area is on one hand informed by the need to collect survey data from taxpayers on how to best allocate taxpayers' monies. On the other hand, there is a need to compare the attitudes and opinions of community members who have substance use histories or proximal exposure to those who did not, as well as to compare to members of the Regional Judicial Opioid Initiative. The purpose of the present project is to collect population normative survey data about funding decisions relevant to the overdose crisis and addiction science. Crowdsourcing techniques will be used. The use of these techniques should increase the diversity and efficiency of data collection relative to traditional methods (e.g., student samples), **Bureau of Justice Assistance: \$5,000.**

The National Center for Health and Justice Integration for Suicide Prevention (NCHATS)

Suicide rates in the United States have steadily increased over the past several decades. Focusing suicide prevention efforts on the healthcare system alone, without consideration of its intersection with other sectors where at-risk individuals may find themselves – particularly, the criminal justice system – has limited reach into at-risk populations. This national practice-based research center, including more than 15 academic, health, and justice institutions and over 100 Consortium Partners, will examine effectiveness, cost-effectiveness, and scalability of suicide prevention activities triggered through real-time linkage of justice and health data. Center projects: (1) take advantage of burgeoning biomedical informatics advances to flag justice system involvement among health system populations and/or suicide risk among justice populations, and (2) demonstrate how these flags can be used in scalable and cost-effective ways for suicide prevention and cross-system service linkage; (3) incorporate implementation science outcomes.
