

I-CPL Plan of Work Options

The Innovation in Community, Policy and Leadership (I-CPL) concentration offer students their choice of three Specializations. Specializations are defined as major starting points for the concentration that unite the macro practice program and distinguish it from other forms of practice. Specializations represent core ideas in macro social work including: Leadership, Community Building/Development, and Policy.

The **Leadership Specialization** is for two types of students: 1) those interested in leadership careers in nonprofit with positions such as program officers in private foundations, or executive directors/administrators of social service agencies or professional leadership positions in social work or 2) those interested in careers related to running a small to midsized nonprofit, or coordinating or directing community-based programs.

The Community Building/Development Specialization offers two focus areas for students interested in: 1) international social work with careers in immigration and human rights, international development, and economic and social development; and 2) broad-based community perspective prepared for work in community development corporations, community organizing and work with community coalitions and place-based initiatives.

The **Policy Specialization** is for students interested in careers related to policy advocacy and/or policy analysis. Policy advocates will be trained in tactics that seek to engage in education, negotiation and mediation to influence policies that support the wellbeing of families and communities. As a policy analyst, students will be prepared for work in government institutions, legislative bodies, and public or private organizations supporting various constituency groups.

Each Specialization will have the same core requirements; however, students will enroll in different courses depending on their Specializations, career focus area and if in the core program or advanced standing program. The research requirement is tailored to student interest and Specialization. All I-CPL students are required to have:

The ICPL concentration allows students to take electives that will supplement their social work foundation and advanced concentration courses. Some degree programs have a required cognate (i.e., mandatory coursework in a related discipline), but at the Wayne State School of Social Work we decided to recommend the option of taking courses in other departments that complement social work training. Taking electives in other departments is an opportunity to gain substantive professional skills as well as prepare social workers to work in multi-disciplinary settings. Electives can be selected to match the Specialization, and career path focus. Electives can also vary depending on which semester the course is offered, how often (e.g., some courses are only offered every other year) and time of day.

There are many options for elective; here is a list of those recommended for each Specialization. *S- Spring/Summer, F-Fall, W-Winter
