Topics covered will include:

- Independent Contracting and Entities 101 – what is an entity, and which entity is right for you? What do you need to know to work as an independent contractor?
- Social Enterprises 101 – how to benefit your community and make money in an equitable and inclusive way to advance social justice
- Select Legal Implications of Operating Community-Based Care Organizations:
 - COVID-19 related grants and forgivable loans
 - Maintaining compliance with and notifying recipients of your organizations' care services of state and federal COVID-19 regulations regarding restrictions, such as stay-at-home orders, capacity limits, etc.
 - Vaccine mandates
 - Turnover in care organizations
 - Increased demand for care organizations' services
 - Telehealth, technology usage, and other privacy concerns in general by care organizations while communicating remotely, internally, or with recipients of your organization's care services
