Small business development is central to the U.S. economy. Small businesses provide critical goods and services, particularly in under-resourced communities. Moreover, a high percentage of the net job growth annually in the U.S. comes from small businesses. The COVID-19 crisis caused an unparalleled economic downturn in the U.S and had a disproportionately negative impact on Black, Indigenous and People of Color (BIPOC)-owned small businesses. Even before the crisis, most black- and brown-owned businesses faced numerous barriers to business start-up and growth including but not limited to access to financial capital. Regarding the significance of the COVID-19 crisis, research economist, Robert Fairlie, notes "the negative early-stage impacts on minority- and immigrant-owned businesses, if prolonged, may be problematic for broader racial inequality because of the importance of minority businesses for local job creation, economic advancement and longer -term wealth inequality."

What can we do as individual consumers and caring professionals to support and advocate for more equitable business and economic development at the local, state, national, and global levels?
